A Message From Our President/CEO

Our organization knew 2024 would be a whirlwind year with the publication of the trauma designation rules, the 35th anniversary of the Texas Trauma System, a remarkably busy survey schedule, and preparations for the 89th Texas Legislative Session. These accomplishments take a team

comprised of staff, surveyors, the TETAF Board of Directors, and TETAF committee members who are resolute to TETAF's mission, "...to strengthen regional health care delivery systems through collaboration, advocacy, and education."

We are proud to highlight the milestones achieved by TETAF and Texas Perinatal Services in 2024:

- The TETAF/Texas Perinatal Services team completed 222 surveys for all service lines, more surveys than in any previous year on record for TETAF.
- TETAF conducted three stakeholder meetings regarding the proposed trauma designation rules, averaging more than 200 stakeholders in attendance during each meeting.
- TETAF provided more than 4,000 continuing professional development hours to learners in every one of the 22 Regional Advisory Councils.
- The TETAF Rural Trauma System Development Fund was established with the 35th Trauma Anniversary Celebration raising more than \$74,000 in recognized revenue.
- TETAF and Texas Perinatal Services proudly sponsored conferences for organizations such as
 the Texas Organization of Rural and Community Hospitals (TORCH), Texas Collaborative for
 Healthy Mothers and Babies (TCHMB), and the Institute for Perinatal Quality Improvement
 (PQI).

The list can certainly go on, but these points were a handful of the centerpieces in 2024 to ensure a strong trauma, stroke, maternal, neonatal, and emergency health care system for Texas. I am proud of the difference TETAF makes each year, and I invite you to learn more about our many successes in this annual report.

Our Mission, Our Story

Our Mission

The Texas EMS Trauma & Acute Care Foundation's mission is to strengthen regional health care delivery systems through collaboration, advocacy, and education.

Our Story

In the early 2000s, the need for survey services in Texas was expanding significantly. Funding was limited due to the Texas Legislature needing to streamline the state's budget. The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) was no longer able to provide survey services due to a reduction in funds. The American College of Surgeons (ACS) was the only option for Level III trauma surveys and there was not an option for Level IVs, plus hospitals voiced concerns regarding the cost of surveys from ACS. Additionally, there was a strong desire to have a community of trauma, EMS, and acute care advocates to speak louder with a centralized voice for advocacy. These concerns and needs led the 22 Regional Advisory Councils (RACs) across the Texas trauma community to support the launch of the Texas EMS, Trauma & Acute Care Foundation (TETAF).

As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, TETAF fills the gap where federal, state, and local governments, and private entities cannot provide statewide services. In 2008, DSHS granted TETAF the authority to provide verification surveys for Level III and Level IV designated trauma facilities. The first TETAF staff members were hired in 2009 to fully implement TETAF's mission. The following year, TETAF's role grew to provide Level III stroke verification surveys. In 2015, TETAF further expanded its reach and was approved to provide neonatal verification surveys. In August 2016, TETAF launched neonatal leveling surveys in Texas and provided more than 100 surveys in the first 3-year cycle.

Following closely behind neonatal, in August 2018 TETAF launched maternal leveling verification surveys along with the creation of TETAF's Texas Perinatal Services division. Texas Perinatal Services continues to lead the state in perinatal verification surveys. Today, with more than 150 credentialed surveyors, TETAF and Texas Perinatal Services provide verification surveys for trauma, stroke, neonatal, and maternal in more hospitals than any other surveying entity.

Driven by our mission, TETAF continues to ensure comprehensive, quality care is provided to patients in Texas.

The Year of the Trauma Designation Rules

The long, anticipated wait for revised trauma designation rules came to an end in 2024 with proposed rules, then the proposed rules were pulled, and then a revised rule to meet the needs of the Texas Trauma System. The proposed trauma designation rule, §157.125 Requirements for Trauma Facility Designation, published on January 19 in the Texas Register.

Understanding that stakeholders wanted to provide feedback to the rules, but had many questions, TETAF led two discussions with stakeholders in February with approximately 250 in attendance for each virtual meeting. The second meeting had focused times for Level III trauma facilities and Level IV trauma facilities to ensure time for discussion from each level of care.

Based on stakeholder concerns and extensive discussion among TETAF staff and the Board of Directors, TETAF submitted formal written comments and provided oral comments during the Texas Health and Human Services Commission Executive Council meeting on February 15. With more than 3,900 comments regarding the proposed rules submitted to the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), the department withdrew the proposed rules in April.

In July, a new rule project was published for the proposed trauma designation rules. The rule project included a revision of Section §157.125. The revised §157.125 terminates on August 31, 2025. A new rule, Section §157.126, concerning Requirements for Trauma Facility Designation, will be implemented on September 1, 2025.

TETAF provided another stakeholder discussion virtual meeting in August and provided additional oral comments to the HHSC Executive Council and formal written comments to DSHS.

Throughout this process, the goal for TETAF was to ensure that the Texas Trauma System continues to be a robust system with access to trauma care for patients in rural and urban areas of the state.

Celebrating 35 Years of the Texas Trauma System

In the 1980s, 70-80% of trauma deaths from automobile accidents occurred on rural roads and injuries cost Texans \$10.8 billion. At that time, most rural hospitals did not have the specialized training to treat traumatic injuries, and some urban hospitals could not take a patient transfer. It was estimated that by the early 1990s, nearly 70,000 Texans would be seriously injured. A group of trauma leaders across Texas knew that care had to improve.

These trauma leaders, comprised of trauma surgeons, trauma nurses, and state government leaders, believed that a more integrated system at regional levels could improve care. In 1989, during the 71st Texas Legislature, House Bill (HB) 18, known as the Omnibus Rural Health Care Rescue Act, was passed. This legislation directed the development of an emergency medical service (EMS) and trauma care system, allowed for the creation of the Trauma Service Areas (TSAs) and the formation of the Regional Advisory Councils (RACs), and outlined the trauma facility designation process. This created the Texas Trauma System.

In August, TETAF commemorated the 35th anniversary of the Texas Trauma System with a celebration and inaugural fundraising event, "Boots & Bling: 35th Anniversary of the Texas Trauma System." TETAF had the distinguished honor of recognizing the founders of the Texas Trauma System during this celebration:

Ahead of the celebration, the TETAF Rural Trauma System Development Fund, which will support the ongoing needs of rural trauma caregivers, was formed. Thanks to the generous support of more than 40 sponsors and more than 200 in attendance at the event, more than \$74,000 was contributed to the fund. Additionally, TETAF held a virtual fundraiser for Giving Tuesday and raised more than \$1,300.

A committee will be formed in 2025 to determine how to best support rural trauma care, manage the distribution of the funds, and seek future ways to develop the fund.



An Ongoing Commitment to Stroke Care

Since 2010, TETAF has provided verification surveys for Level III designated stroke centers, now the Acute Stroke Ready Level IV designation, according to the latest Requirements for Stroke Facility Designation in the Texas Administrative Code that went into effect in September 2022. TETAF has a team of experienced stroke surveyors who can provide consultation and verification surveys.

Although it is available for urban areas, providing this level of stroke verification surveys is paramount to ensuring stroke care continues to align with national stroke standards and is available in 25 rural Texas hospitals.



NEONATAL

TETAF established Texas Perinatal Services using its proven quality assurance model. The first service line to launch was neonatal.

One Year of the New Neonatal Level of Care Designation Rule

For the first time since the neonatal level of care designation rules were established in 2016, neonatal facilities were surveyed according to a revised Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 133, Subchapter J beginning in January 2024.

Prior to the new rule taking effect, Jessica Phillips, MAS, BSN, RNC-OB, C-EFM, C-ONQS, perinatal program director, provided training for neonatal surveyors and provided live informational sessions focused on the rule updates to hospital partners.

Texas Perinatal Services (TPS) surveys 71% of the hospitals designated and in 2024 TPS surveyed 65 neonatal facilities.

A National Perspective of Neonatal Care

Since its inception, Texas Perinatal Services (TPS) has focused on what is happening with neonatal care in Texas and across the nation. Collaborating with organizations at the local, state, and national levels is essential to understand and learn more about the care provided in all areas of the United States.

In 2024, Jessica Phillips, MAS, BSN, RNC-OB, C-EFM, C-ONQS, perinatal program director, and Jorge Castañon, MSN, RN attended the Texas Collaborative for Healthy Mothers and Babies (TCHMB) Summit in February and the National Association of Neonatal Nurses (NANN) conference in September. Phillips also attended the Association of Women's Health, Obstetric and Neonatal Nurses (AWHONN) National conference in June and the AWHONN Texas conference in May.

Texas Perinatal Services is proud of its perinatal team having years of prior hospital experience and perpetual learning of neonatal care in all areas.



MATERNAL

The End of a Cycle for Maternal Care

Since its inception, Texas Perinatal Services (TPS) has completed two maternal level of care designation cycles. During that time, our hospital partners were surveyed to the original rule that went into effect in 2018 and to the revised rule that went into effect in 2023.

In 2024, TPS surveyed 54 maternal facilities requiring a survey in Texas.

Texas Perinatal Services is proud of the ongoing relationship with its hospital partners. During the interim between surveys, TPS continues to provide ongoing support for its hospital partners through education and advocacy, and is committed to being there before, during, and after each survey.



ADVOCACY

Ongoing Advocacy for Stronger Regional Health Care Systems

Advocating on behalf of the Regional Advisory Councils (RACs) and for needs in trauma, maternal, neonatal, and emergency and acute care, occurs while the legislature is in session and during the interim.

TETAF's lead advocate, Dinah Welsh, leads the advocacy efforts. Welsh has decades of experience advocating in the health care arena. Welsh not only advocates at the state level, but at a national level she is a member of the Trauma Center Association of America (TCAA) Advocacy Committee, which meets monthly. She also participates in the annual TCAA Day at the Capitol in Washington, D.C. TETAF also has an Advocacy Committee which meets frequently during the legislative session and continues to meet during the interim to discuss opportunities to strengthen regional health care systems.

Oral comments were provided in 2024 regarding the proposed trauma designation rules during the Texas Health and Human Services Commission Executive Council meetings and maternal data collection in Texas during the Perinatal Advisory Council meeting. In addition to providing oral comments, TETAF board, staff, and committee members, held regular meetings with leadership from the Texas Department of State Health Services to discuss priority issues.

Preparing for the 89th Legislative Session

The TETAF Advocacy Committee, staff, and board members work months in advance of the legislative session to strategize, develop, and prepare the TETAF Legislative Priorities. These priorities are used as a focus for advocating during the session.

The committee held meetings twice a month to discuss and draft leading priorities. The priorities for the 89th Texas Legislative Session have been identified as:

- Acknowledgement of the critical role of the Regional Advisory Councils (RACs)
- Increase funding to the Texas Trauma System
- Establish a statewide perinatal database
- Improve and fund regional health care data collection efforts

In addition to developing the priorities, Dinah Welsh provided oral comments on the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) Legislative Appropriations Request (LAR) and the department's budget as it relates to regional health care needs. Additionally, TETAF met with legislators and legislative staff during the legislative interim.

The 89th Texas Legislative Session begins on January 14, 2025.

TETAF Provides Educational Offerings Across Texas

The educational offerings provided by TETAF are led by an effort from Courtney Edwards, DNP, MPH, RN, CCRN, CEN, TCRN, NEA-BC, education coordinator, and the TETAF Education Committee.

TETAF proudly awarded 2,292 continuing professional development hours in 2024 for the Texas Pediatric Readiness Project. Additionally, hours were awarded for five Texas Quality Care Forums, three Texas Trauma Coordinators Forums (TTCF), two Texas TQIP events, two virtual TETAF Hospital Data Management Courses (HDMC), one TTCF Trauma Designation Education Course, and one Regional Advisory Council (RAC) Education Symposium. TETAF educational offerings were awarded to participants representing every RAC in Texas with a total of 4,018 continuing professional development hours provided.

TETAF Hospital Data Management Course Stays Virtual


Since 2020, TETAF has offered its most popular course, the TETAF Hospital Data Management Course (HDMC) virtually. In 2024, the virtual course was offered twice, in the summer and in the fall. The virtual format has provided a convenience to those who cannot travel and attend in-person.

Leading trauma and data experts present on topics such as data abstraction, data entry, trauma validation and patient information, and trauma coding during the two-day course. Participants earn continuing professional development hours for completing the course and a brief questionnaire.

TETAF Successfully Redesignated as a Provider of Nursing Continuing Professional Development

Providing educational opportunities is a key component of TETAF's mission. For several years, TETAF has been credentialed by the Louisiana State Nurses Association (LSNA) to provide continuing professional development since the Texas Nurses Association no longer credentials continuing education.

In December 2024, TETAF's Approved Provider Unit status application was approved to continue providing education.

TETAF Supports Regional Advisory Councils on Proposed Rules

Since its inception, TETAF has advocated on behalf of the Regional Advisory Councils (RACs). In 2024, TETAF held a virtual meeting in February for the RAC executive directors and chairs to discuss the proposed RAC rules to ensure the proposed changes would be beneficial for the RACs and the regions they serve.

Based on discussion from the meeting, TETAF developed formal written comments and submitted them to the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS). The §157.123 Regional Advisory Council Requirements were adopted in November 2024 and were implemented on December 1, 2024.

TETAF also hosts the annual RAC Summit every December to bring RAC leaders together for strategic planning, best practice sharing, and development discussions. Additionally, the TETAF Advocacy Committee focused on upcoming needs to include in the TETAF Legislative Priorities for the 89th Legislative Session.


Our Surveyors
